Faculty Scholarly and Creative Excellence



I am pleased to present the inaugural volume of what is intended to be an annual showcase of the scholarly and creative excellence of the Faculty of Hartwick College. As I reflect on my first year as Chief Academic Officer, I am struck not only by the quantity of such scholarship, but also by its high quality and its range of disciplinary coverage. These accomplishments run the gamut from Anthropology to Zoology, including several examples of how Hartwick integrates liberal arts education with experiential learning. I also note that this impressive scholarly profile has diminished neither the quality of instruction nor the personal attention to students for which the College has long been noted.

The works listed here represent the scholarly and creative productivity of Hartwick's full-time faculty between July 1, 2009 and June 30, 2010. Faculty members have published books, book chapters, and journal articles both in print and online. They have presented or performed their work at conferences, recital and exhibit halls, and other venues. And they have successfully competed for grants from prestigious public and private foundations and other funding sources. Most have invested significant amounts of time mentoring students in their scholarly and creative endeavors, much of which also has been brought to the attention of their peers beyond Oyaron Hill.

Faculty and student engagement in research, scholarship, and creative activity is a hallmark of a healthy and vibrant liberal arts college at which knowledge is not merely transmitted to others, but also discovered, created, and cultivated. The Hartwick Faculty is committed to the teacher-scholar model, and as stated in the faculty manual "expects its members to maintain disciplinary expertise, to remain intellectually vital and professionally engaged, and to cultivate the necessary skills and resources needed to inspire students and to develop courses. Faculty are encouraged to communicate their scholarly insights in public forums and to convey the excitement and importance of scholarly inquiry to students." Thus, their involvement in scholarly activity informs and strengthens their teaching, which in turn helps provide inspiration and insight that catalyzes their scholarship.

While I look forward each year to reporting these accomplishments, reviewing them simultaneously inspires and humbles me. Please join me in congratulating the Faculty for their 2009-10 scholarly accomplishments, for their prior work, and for their ongoing commitment to the life of the mind.

Susan Navarette

Margaret B. Bunn Award for Outstanding Teaching

Susan Navarette, Professor of English, was named the 2010 recipient of Hartwick College's Margaret B. Bunn Award for Outstanding Teaching at the College's Commencement in May 2010. Navarette received the B.A. at Brown University, and the M.A. and Ph.D. at the University of Michigan. She joined the Hartwick faculty in 2001.

Navarette is known for her colorful and enthusiastic teaching style, and her flair for energetic and colorful self-parody. She herself is believed to have coined the term "Navarettian." She makes heavy use of visual aids to bring the cultural contexts of her authors alive, and has been known to tear a 17th century title-page inside out, deconstructing and then reconstructing it from every conceivable—and inconceivable—angle. Navarette favors edgy subject matter, and it may not be entirely an accident that one of the first courses she taught at Hartwick was entitled "*Unruly Women*." She has been described by colleagues as "first and foremost, a teacher of high caliber, amazing energy, and great intellectual scope." As one student commented, "She is amazing! A fun professor who actually teaches you stuff."

Margaret Brigham Bunn was for many years a loyal friend of Hartwick who understood the centrality of the interaction between teacher and student. She served as a Trustee of the College for 14 years. When she died in 1978, her colleagues on the Board established this award, which provides substantial financial support to an individual judged by students who graduated five years earlier to have been the most outstanding faculty member with whom they studied.





Gary E. Stevens

Teacher-Scholar Award

Gary E. Stevens, Professor of Mathematics, was named the 2010 recipient of Hartwick College's Teacher-Scholar Award at the College's annual Honors Convocation in May 2010. Stevens received the B.S., M.A., and M.S. from Bowling Green State University, and the Ph.D. from the University of Michigan. He joined the Hartwick faculty in 1974.

Stevens' published articles and reviews, reflecting an impressive intellectual breadth, cover topics ranging from *Isomorphic Factorizations of Some Linearly Recursive Trees* to *How Many Ways Can You Color Your Turkey?: Counting the Proper Colorings of a Grid Graph*. He regularly collaborates with students, who over the years have made discoveries in graph theory that have led to presentations and publications in professional-level conferences and journals. Through Stevens' scholarship, his students are involved in all phases of the mathematical process, from creating questions to finding solutions and disseminating results. This approach carries over to the classroom, in which Stevens employs a multitude of strategies to help students understand cutting-edge mathematics.

Given each year to a faculty member in recognition of the tradition of the teacher-scholar, the award honors a professor who "enhances teaching through scholarship, research, or creative work, integrating the perspective of seeker and teacher, and demonstrates to students and colleagues the value and excitement of scholarly inquiry." The awardee is chosen by a faculty committee.

Thomas Travisano

Winifred D. Wandersee Scholar-In-Residence

Thomas Travisano, Professor of English, was named the 2010-11 recipient of the Hartwick College Winifred D. Wandersee Scholar-in-Residence Award at the College's annual Honors Convocation in May 2010. Travisano received the B.A. from Haverford College, and the M.A. and Ph.D. from the University of Virginia. He joined the Hartwick faculty in 1994.

Throughout the 2010-11 academic year, Travisano will focus on a new critical biography of Elizabeth Bishop. Travisano has published several articles and book chapters focusing on Bishop, whom he has studied since before she was the subject of the doctoral dissertation he completed in 1981. Most notably, he has edited two volumes of *The New Anthology of American Poetry*, with a third volume on the way, and *Words in Air: The Complete Letters of Elizabeth Bishop and Robert Lowell*. The latter received glowing reviews from such publications as *The New York Times Book Review*, *The New Yorker*, *The New Republic*, and *The Wall Street Journal*, among others. *The Washington Post* named the book to its Best of 2008 list, as did UK papers *The Guardian* and *The Spectator*.

Given annually in memory of Professor of History and Chair of the Faculty Dr. Winifred D. Wandersee, the award recognizes a strong record of commitment and accomplishment in scholarship. Among her many contributions to Hartwick, Wandersee is credited with shepherding the scholar-in-residence program that is named in her honor. Winners of the award, chosen by a faculty committee, are provided financial support for their scholarly or artistic projects and research and afforded the opportunity to present their work to the campus community through lectures and classroom visits.
