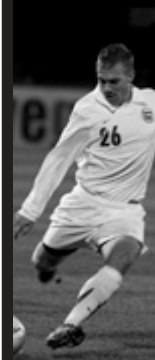
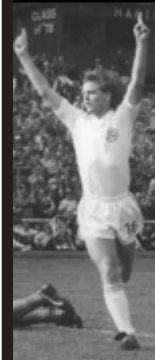
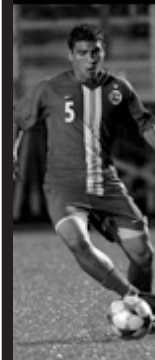

2009 SEASON OUTLOOK

The Hartwick men's soccer program, following a 7-5-7 season a year ago, will play against five teams this year that participated in the 2008 NCAA Tournament. Head coach Ian McIntyre, entering his seventh season at the helm, returns 15 letter winners and welcomes 15 talented newcomers to the lineup this fall. Despite being such a youthful group, there are definite expectations being placed on this season's squad. The Hawks were picked to finish second in the MAC Coaches' Poll and anything less than a berth in the national tournament will be seen as somewhat of a disappointment.

"Our goal every year at Hartwick is to qualify for the NCAA Tournament," McIntyre stated. "Ending the 2008 season in the shootout was an abrupt end and a tough way to go out, and ultimately we fell short of our goal. The good news is there were great signs for the future and we have a solid foundation returning."

McIntyre brings back seven starters from last season and believes each player's role in the success of the team will be vital.

"It will be key for players like (Sam) Wright, (Brian) Gordon, (Steven) Amaya, and (Jeremy) Vuolo amongst others, to help this team evolve," said the 'Wick boss. "I'm counting on each of the upperclassmen to adopt important leadership roles within the group."

In addition to the returning players, 15 newcomers will be ushered into the Hartwick family this August. McIntyre believes that many of the new players are bursting with talent and coupled with the veterans, could produce a very deep, versatile, exciting side this fall.

"It's got the potential to be a very strong group. We're looking for several of the new guys to play important roles for us this year."

GOALKEEPERS

'Wick's defensive corps begins with junior goalkeeper Jeremy Vuolo. He started all 19 games last season earning six shutouts and a goals against average of just 0.92, which was third-best in the MAC.

"Jeremy is one of the best goalkeepers in the MAC," said McIntyre. "He was a big-time player last season and we're looking for more from him this fall." Vuolo will be challenged by junior transfer Jake Wright and freshmen Lee Fenner and Nolan Brown. Wright is a 6-foot-1 transfer from Cal-State Northridge who played for

Orange County Blue Star of the PDL. Fenner hails from the Albany area while Brown arrives at 'Wick from Kansas City.

BACKS

Four experienced defenders with a combined 51 starts between them last season return on the backline. Junior Owen Botting led the team in assists with seven last season on the left flank. He was one of only four players on the squad to start every game in 2008. Senior Brian Gordon, who made 12 starting appearances in 16 matches also returns. He netted two goals a year

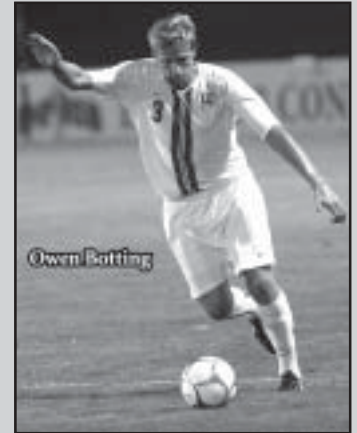
ago – one in a 2-2 draw with Bucknell and the other in the 4-0 MAC playoff win over Western Michigan. Juniors Nick Pratico and Carson Pryde return after solid campaigns in the back. Pratico made eight starts and registered the game-winning header in a 1-0 win over Colgate. Pryde started in the final eight games of the year for the Hawks playing in 16 contests.

A pair of Swedes, in their first seasons with the Hawks, could figure into the lineup on defense. Konrad Andersson, who has represented Sweden at the U17 national level, is a strong back who is very comfortable on the ball. Jakob Karlgren should also compete for a starting role. A fellow Scandinavian, Joel Jalanne, could also fit into the defensive unit. Newcomers Pedro Andreoni and Ramsay Hartley should figure into the mix as well.

"In the back, we will have a lot of capable, talented players," said McIntyre. "We gave up just eight goals in the last 12 games of the season last year and we will be looking to build upon this foundation. It will be about finding the right blend of players across our back four."

MIDFIELD

In the midfield, McIntyre brings back four talented veterans in senior Sam Wright, juniors Steven Amaya and Michael Cunningham, and sophomore Nick Roydhouse. Wright started 18 matches in his first tour with 'Wick and netted the game-clinching goal in a 3-1 win versus UNC Wilmington at last season's Mayor's Cup. Amaya tied for fourth in points on the team in 2008 with three goals and two assists. The technical midfielder tallied against New Hampshire, Northern Illinois, and Western Michigan last season and was a MAC second teamer in 2007. Cunningham played in 18 matches earning



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three assists. In two seasons with the Blue and White, he has notched a goal and seven helpers. Roydhouse made 10 starts on the outside and set up two Hartwick goals in his maiden season with the program.

"We'll need all four returning midfielders to turn it up a notch this season," McIntyre added. "With all four players at top-form, we could be a dominant group in the middle of the field."

McIntyre believes a handful of incoming players could also find their way into the starting lineup, including Finland native Niko Tirkkonen, Stony Brook transfer Jherrett Maroney, and English product Simon Greatwich.

"Tirkkonen has a nice left foot and is a good strong player," McIntyre stated. "Maroney adds pace and speed in the middle third, and Greatwich is a very technical and clever player."

Returning players Patrick Thompson and Tim Daigle will provide added depth in the midfield position.

FORWARDS

The lone returning pure striker to the team is sophomore Dan Summers. He made an immediate impression with the Hawks in his first campaign scoring three goals and assisting two others in 10 starts. His first career goal in a Hartwick uniform led to a 2-1 win over Fordham in late September, and he tallied twice in a 2-1 victory at Western Michigan. Junior Evan Doan, who saw action in 18 of 19 matches last season in the midfield, will make the transition to striker.



Bryant & Stratton transfer Jumol Harewood and Jamaican product Cleyon Brown should make an immediate impact up top for the Hawks.

"Harewood is a big, physical presence on the field and he has a knack for scoring goals," added McIntyre. "He is a player we're expecting a strong season from. Brown will certainly see time up front as well."

Newcomers Mike Wysocki from Somers, CT, and Jason Keefe of Springfield, MA will also compete for time on the pitch at the striker position.

THE SCHEDULE

This season the Hawks will compete against the champions of the Ivy League, Patriot League, Northeast Conference and MAAC with additional games against teams from the Big East, Atlantic 10, America East and the Mid-American Conference.

McIntyre has created a very demanding and exciting schedule that will prepare the team to compete for the 2009 Mid-American Conference Championship. McIntyre's Hawks, after road exhibition matches in August versus 2008 NCAA Tournament

participants Fairleigh Dickinson and Connecticut, have a home warm-up versus Albany.

"The exhibition games will be good tests for us as we try to evaluate the players and see how everyone meshes with each other," said McIntyre.

The Hawks officially open up regular season play away from Elmore Field with a pair of games at Fordham and Marist. Hartwick outlasted the Rams at home in overtime last season on Sept. 27th. 'Wick is unbeaten against the Red Foxes (7-0-0) in seven previous meetings with the last victory coming in 2000.

The Big Red of Cornell will then come to town for Hartwick's home opener on Monday, Sept. 7th at 7 p.m. The Hawks have accumulated 30 wins in 45 matches against Cornell all-time.

Mayor's Cup weekend takes place between Sept. 11th-13th with the Hawks hosting Bucknell and Loyola at Elmore Field. The Hawks entertain the Bison in the tournament's second game at 7:30 p.m. on Friday night. Hartwick drew with the Bison 2-2 last season at the Bucknell Days Inn Classic. 'Wick then closes out play against Loyola on Sunday at 2:30 p.m. The Greyhounds downed the Blue and White 2-0 last season en route to an 18-0-1 regular season campaign.

Following a road contest at Hartford (Sept. 19), 'Wick begins Mid-American Conference play on the road at Buffalo on Sept. 22nd.

"The MAC will be good from top to bottom," said the Hartwick skipper.

The Hawks then return home to host Dartmouth four days later on Sept. 26th. The Big Green finished the season 11-6-2, won the Ivy League, and made it to the NCAA Third Round a year ago.

The Hawks host Northern Illinois to open October during Hartwick's Homecoming Weekend on Oct. 3rd, travel to defending Patriot League champ Colgate on Oct. 6th, and host Florida Atlantic during Parents' Weekend on Oct. 10th. 'Wick was edged in overtime 2-1 at NIU, defeated the local rival Raiders 1-0, and were held to a goalless 0-0 draw in Boca Raton against the Owls last season.

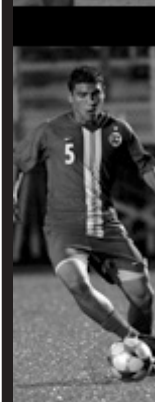
The Hawks battle the Orange of Syracuse on the road on Oct. 13th. 'Wick leads the all-time series going 16-11-5 against 'Cuse dating back to 1977. After a MAC clash at Bowling Green on Oct. 25th, the Hawks return home and look to stay unbeaten against conference foe Western Michigan (2-0-2) in a match on Halloween.

'Wick will get its shot at breaking its winless streak against Binghamton on Tuesday, Nov. 3rd at Elmore Field. The Hawks, who have not beaten the Bearcats since 2001, dropped three straight from 2005-2007 before gaining a 0-0 tie on Sept. 23rd of last year.

The regular season concludes where it ended last season for Hartwick - in Akron, OH.

The Hawks seek another spot in the MAC Tournament which takes place from Friday, Nov. 13th to Sun., Nov. 15th at the top seed following the regular season.

"It's going to be an exciting season with a number of fantastic home games at Elmore Field. We've got a great group and I believe we are going to play a very entertaining brand of soccer."





IAN McINTYRE '96 Head Coach

Ian McIntyre '96 has presided over the Hartwick men's soccer program for six seasons and has registered a 61-32-21 record at his alma mater. In his 10 years as a head coach, he has led his teams to a combined 97-60-28 record and one trip to the NCAA Tournament.

In 2008, McIntyre piloted Hartwick to a 7-5-7 overall record and 2-2-2 showing in its second year in the Mid-American Conference. After a 4-0 romp of Western Michigan in the MAC quarterfinals, the Hawks took nationally fourth ranked Akron to the limit on its own field in the semifinals, ultimately falling short in a penalty-kick shootout. Seniors John Paul Boyle '09 and Liam Parrington both were first team all-MAC selections with Jonathan Garcia-Torres '09 earning second team accolades. Boyle also earned all-region honors for the second straight season.

Two years ago, under McIntyre's direction, the Hawks entered their first season in the Mid-American Conference and finished with a 5-6-7 record, secured the third seed in the league tournament, and a spot in the MAC semifinals. McIntyre coached three all-league mentions led by first team honoree Boyle. Hartwick put two members on the all-region squad, a list which included first team selection Parrington.

The Hawks wrapped up their first season as members of the Atlantic Soccer Conference in 2006 with an 8-10-2 record,

falling in the conference semi-finals. Three years ago, McIntyre coached seven players who received league accolades, including player of the year Tyler Hemming '07.

In 2005, he led Hartwick to a league crown and its 23rd trip to the NCAA Tournament, as the Hawks posted a 13-6-1 mark. Hartwick posted back-to-back shutouts over Philadelphia (4-0) and cross-town rival Oneonta State (2-0) in the league tournament to earn an automatic berth into the NCAA Championships before falling to Seton Hall, 2-1, in the opening round of the tournament. For his effort, McIntyre was named as the Atlantic Soccer Conference Coach of the Year in 2005, and he was chosen the NSCAA New York Region Coach of the Year following the 2004 campaign.

While at Hartwick he has coached conference players of the year Edwin Ruiz '07 in 2004, and Hemming, who was drafted by Toronto FC in the supplemental portion of the MLS Expansion Draft, in 2005 and 2006. He also recruited and coached goalie Josh Wagenaar '07, who signed to play professionally for ADO Den Haag in the top professional league in Holland.

McIntyre, a 1996 Hartwick graduate, was introduced as the sixth head coach in the program's 53-year history on March 13, 2003. In his first season at the helm, McIntyre guided the Hawks to a 15-2-1 record, including a 3-1-1 record and a second-place finish in the ASC. Hartwick registered a 13-

3-3 record (4-1 ASC) and placed second in the league the following season.

As a player from 1992-95, McIntyre was named a first team NSCAA/Umbro All-American honoree as a senior. In addition, he was a three-time GTE Academic All-American recipient.

McIntyre, who registered 18 goals and 10 assists, was known as a clutch scorer. Hartwick sported a 52-20-7 record and made two trips to the NCAA Tournament in his four-year career. McIntyre scored game-winning goals in NCAA Tournament wins over Rutgers and Boston University in 1993, and he led Hartwick to a tournament appearance in 1995. The Hawks had a 16-0-1 record when McIntyre scored a goal in his varsity career.

McIntyre, who graduated with summa cum laude honors from Hartwick, won the President's Senior Scholar Athlete award. He was the 1995-96 Hartwick Male Athlete of the Year and was selected as the recipient of the Harry Mosher Award the same year.

In 2001, he was enshrined into the Hartwick College Athletic Hall of Fame in his first year on the ballot.

A native of Basildon, England, McIntyre started his collegiate coaching career as an assistant at Fairfield from 1996-98 under another Hartwick alumnus, Carl Rees '88. McIntyre also coached the Region I amateur team to the gold medal at the 1999 United States Soccer Festival in Portland, Oregon.

He left Fairfield to assume head coaching duties for the former Division I soccer program at Oneonta State, where he posted a 36-28-7 record from 1999 through 2002. McIntyre led the Red Dragons to three straight double-digit winning seasons and was named Independent Coach of the Year after leading the team to a 10-6-1 record in 1999. His Oneonta team upset Hartwick in the 1999 Mayor's Cup title game, his first year at the helm of that program.

McIntyre and his wife, Jennifer, live in Oneonta with their daughter Lyla and their dog Elmore.



JUKKA MASALIN Assistant Coach

Jukka Masalin is entering his second year as assistant coach of the Hawks. His primary responsibilities include coaching the goalkeepers and recruiting.

Masalin brings a wealth of coaching and playing experience to the Hartwick men's soccer program. As a player, his professional career has seen him travel to Germany, Sweden, and Finland before finishing in the United States.

Masalin successfully made the transition from playing to the coaching ranks and he served as the assistant coach for the Rochester Raging Rhinos of the USL-1. During his time with the Rhinos, he was in charge of goalie training, team fitness, and speed training. Masalin also scouted, recruited, and negotiated with players from all over the world and started the professional youth academy infrastructure in Rochester. This past spring, Masalin served as the head coach of the Maine Sting of the National Premier Soccer League (NPSL).

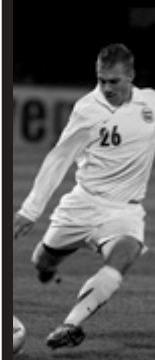
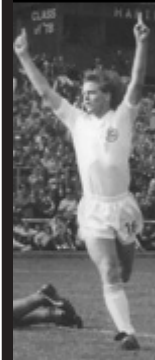
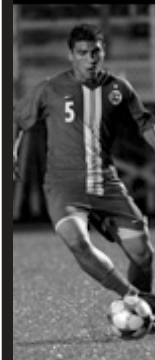

In 1995, he embarked on his collegiate

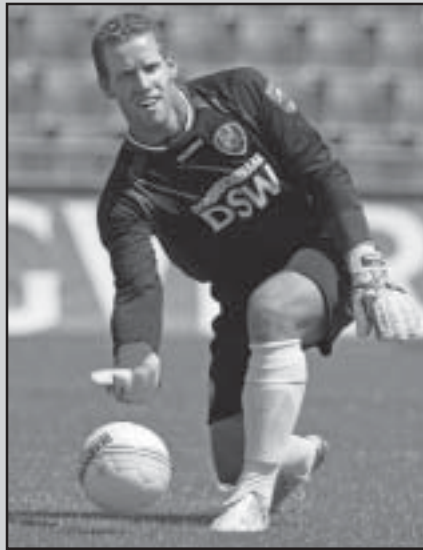

Q & A With a Pair of 'Wick Greats



Josh Wagenaar recently inked a one-year deal with Falkirk F.C. in the Scottish Premier League.



Tyler Hemming, of the USL's Charleston Battery, made his debut with the full Canadian national team on May 30th in a 1-0 win over Cyprus.

The Hartwick Coaching staff is excited to welcome a talented recruiting class to the 'Wick in 2009. Coach McIntyre has even gone as far as to favorably compare the depth of this year's class to that of 2003 which included Edwin Ruiz, Josh Wagenaar, Tyler Hemming, Craig Potter, Phil Flannery, Omar Gordon, Eldin Sjercic and Kenny Rodriguez. In 2003 the new additions led Hartwick to a 15-2-1 record and both Josh Wagenaar and Tyler Hemming are now plying their trade in the professional ranks. This summer we sat down with Wagenaar (Wags) and Hemming to discuss their time at Hartwick and their professional exploits that have led them to England, Holland, Finland, Canada and the United States.

1. **What has been your most memorable soccer experience?**

(Tyler) – “My most memorable soccer moment to date was probably my professional debut with Toronto FC in Major League Soccer - it was long awaited after being injured for most of the season. Also, my senior debut with the Canadian Men's National Team in Cyprus- it was a lifelong goal and dream of mine to represent my country.”

(Wags) - “I would have to say that my most memorable soccer experience would have to be when I was still in college when I went Honduras to try and qualify for the U-20 World Cup. We were set to play a round robin of 3 games against Mexico, hosts Honduras and Jamaica. We won the first game against Mexico 2-1 after falling behind early 1-0. We won the next

game 1-0 against Honduras in front of a raucous Honduran crowd. That win secured a spot for us in Holland and that feeling of having qualified when the odds were stacked against us was an unbelievable feeling!”

2. **Who has been the best player that you have played against and why?**

(Tyler) – “I would have to say that it would be David Beckham with the Galaxy and Rui Costa with Benfica. Although both players were certainly past their prime, they have both accomplished so much throughout their esteemed careers. Both were (and still are) fantastic passers of the ball.”

(Wags) - “I would have to say that the best player that I have played against was Mido the Egyptian striker who was playing for Middlesborough against my Yeovil team. He was a fantastic passer of the ball and connected passes that other players would not have dreamt of. And his ability to free himself up to always be an option for his teammates was incredible.”

3. **Why did you choose Hartwick College and attend school in the States?**

(Wags) - “I chose to attend Hartwick College because it seemed like the best stepping stone for me to continue to pursue my dream of becoming a professional soccer player. While in High School I trained several times a week and usually played a

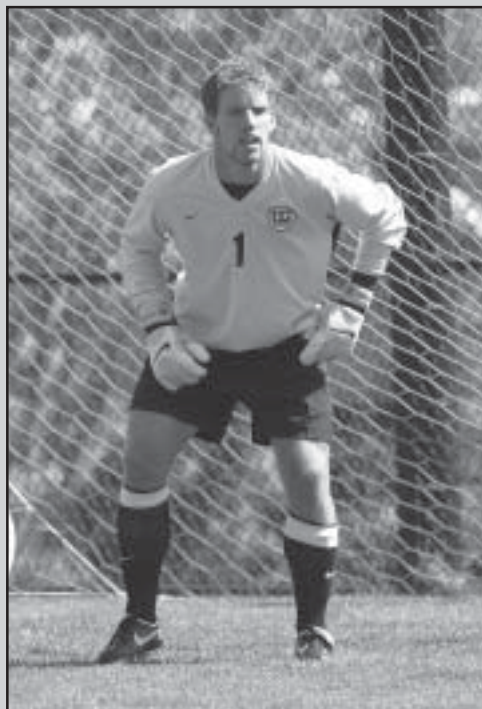
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game. At Hartwick, like in a professional environment, you train competitively everyday with a game or two a week.”

(Tyler) - “I attended school in the States because it offered me an opportunity to play soccer at a high level, while getting an education at the same time. I chose Hartwick because it was the best option for me athletically and academically. I was impressed with Hartwick’s facilities and coaching environment. It also helped that I knew that Wags was going to attend Hartwick as well.”

4. What do you miss most about your time here at Hartwick?



Wagenaar was a two-time all-conference keeper and recorded a goals against average under 1.0 in each of his three seasons with the Hawks.

(Wags) - “I tell a lot of people that my time at Hartwick was some of the very best years of my life. I think that this is due to the fact that all my closest friends are my former Hartwick teammates. The connection that you create with

your teammates at Hartwick is incredible. From the moment we started at Hartwick we did everything together. After training we would all be in the *Commons* eating dinner together and we all lived together in the dorms. The only way I was able to get any work done was if I shut myself away in some remote corner of the library. It was fantastic! Oh... and of course I miss Mac!!!”

(Tyler) - “Without a doubt, I miss how close the soccer team was at Hartwick. The friends that I made, the experiences we shared, the laughs we had was a special time in my life. As a group we had so much fun on and off the field.”

5. How did Hartwick prepare you for a professional soccer career?

(Tyler) - “It provided me with everything that I needed to improve / develop as a player and person. Similar to a professional soccer environment we had great diversity in the team.”

(Wags) - “It is a very natural transition from playing in college at Hartwick to playing professionally. The only difference being that when you are playing professionally you have even more free time than in college!”

6. What first hand advice would you pass on to young players embarking on a Hartwick career?

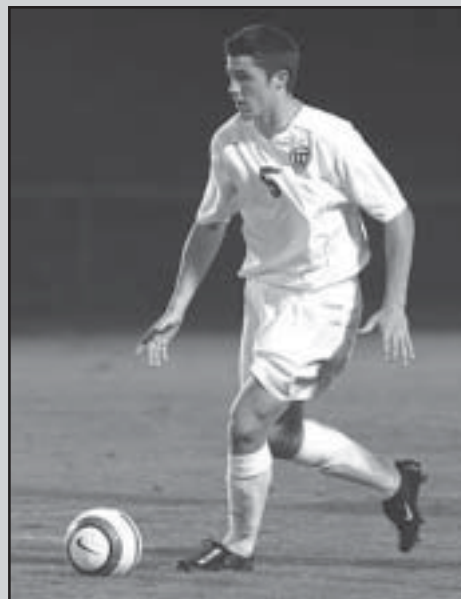

(Tyler) - “Introduce yourself to Laurie from the *Commons*. She makes the best eggs in the world!”

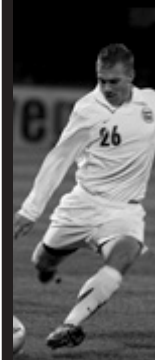
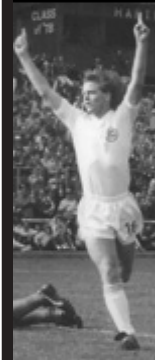
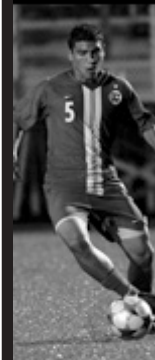
7. Where do you see yourself in five, ten, fifteen years time?

2008 Rewind

Hartwick ended the 2008 season with a very respectable 7-5-7 record, notched undefeated showings at the Bucknell Tournament and Mayor's Cup XXXIII, and earned a spot in the Mid-American Conference semifinals in just its second year in the league. Three of the Hawks' five losses were to teams that eventually qualified for the NCAA Tournament with the other two coming in the season-opener against Drexel and on the road in overtime to MAC finalist Northern Illinois.

The Hawks' season ultimately ended just one step away from competing for the conference title. 'Wick battled its way through 110 minutes with #4 Akron on the Zips' home field before falling in a shootout.

"It certainly was a cruel way to end the season," said Hartwick boss Ian McIntyre. "The bottom line for us though, is that we showed tremendous promise and we will learn from it and move the program forward."

Any fan watching the 2008 Hawks should agree, the Hawks are moving in the right direction.

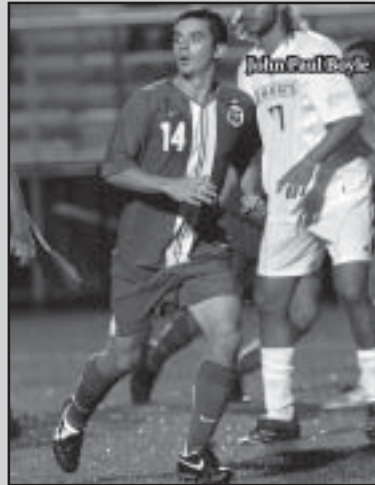
After a pair of defeats at the Loyola Tournament to start the season - one to Drexel (2-1) and one to Mark Mettrick's '87 Greyhounds (2-0), 'Wick returned home in search of its 20th Mayor's Cup title.

In the team's tournament opener, Hartwick deserved better, but had to settle for a 0-0 draw with Florida Gulf Coast in front of a packed house of over 2,100 at Elmore Field. Win number one came two days later as John Paul Boyle struck twice and Sam Wright added another in the first 22 minutes of action in a 3-1 win over UNC Wilmington.

'Wick looked to take the momentum on the road at the Bucknell Tournament the following weekend, but despite carrying leads into the final 10 minutes in both of their matches, the squad was forced to settle for a pair of ties.

Steven Amaya and Boyle scored for Hartwick against New Hampshire, which entered the game unbeaten. The Wildcats, however, would level the score in the 82nd minute to escape the match with a 2-2 draw.

Two days later against the host Bison, an Evan Doan tally in the 76th minute not only handed Hartwick a 2-1 lead, but gave the Hawks a shot at capturing the



tournament crown. Less than six minutes later, again in the 82nd minute, a Bison goal sunk any 'Wick title hopes.

The Hawks would need to sort themselves out before their next game six days later in Hanover, NH against #18 Dartmouth. The Hawks did just that, playing the Big Green even through 89 minutes. The hosts managed to escape with the win thanks to a penalty kick goal in the last minute of play.

The 'Wick defense would tighten up following the Dartmouth match, surrendering just one goal in the next five contests. After a 0-0 tie at Binghamton, Boyle set up Austin McCann for the game-winner in overtime to give Hartwick a 2-1 victory over Fordham, which started a three-game win streak.

In the Blue and White's MAC opener with Bowling Green, the Falcons simply could not handle the service of Owen Botting as the sophomore back scored directly from a corner and then set up Liam Parrington's header on another in a 2-0 shutout.

Nick Pratico's early header proved to be the difference in a 1-0 blanking of Colgate three days later, and keeper Jeremy Vuolo recorded his third straight clean sheet in a 0-0 deadlock at Florida Atlantic.

'Wick let another win slip through their fingers at Northern Illinois taking a 1-0 lead deep into the second half. A penalty in 76th minute sent the game to a golden goal situation where the Huskies would controversially get the game-winner in the second 10-minute session.

Upon returning home, Boyle's fifth tally of the season sent Hartwick past

Brown 1-0 to set the stage for a showdown at Elmore with #2 Akron. After 44 minutes of scoreless play, the Zips broke the tie just before the half, and tacked on another with just over 16 minutes left in the match. Boyle cut the advantage in half with five minutes remaining and the Hawks scrambled for the equalizer, but Akron ran off the clock to stay unbeaten in the MAC tables.

In the final home game of the season, Hartwick played well enough for the win but only managed a 1-1 draw with Buffalo. The Hawks then came from behind and won 2-1 in overtime at Western Michigan thanks to a Dan Summers' double. The win clinched the fourth seed and a return meeting with the Broncos less than a week later in the MAC quarterfinals in Akron, OH.

The Hawks were an inspired group heading into the playoffs. 'Wick simply outclassed WMU in a 4-0 rout. Parrington would tally twice in the match as the Hawks advanced to the semifinals for the second straight year.

The Hawks faced an uphill battle against the Zips in the semifinals, having to play the #4 team in the country on their home field and in front of over 1,000 boisterous Akron supporters. Scoring chances were at a premium but the Hawks played evenly with their hosts throughout the match. With just 10 minutes to play in the match, Boyle slipped in what would prove to be his final goal in a 'Wick uniform to give Hartwick a 1-0 lead. The Hawks killed off seven minutes, but Akron would break their hearts with the tying goal less than four minutes from a berth in the championship. After 20 minutes of extra time, the Zips prevailed 3-0 in the shootout, ending the Blue and White's season.

Parrington and Boyle were both named to the all-tournament team. Both players were also selected to the MAC First Team with Jonathan Garcia-Torres earning second team honors. Boyle would go on to earn all-region honors. He established himself as one of the premier attackers in the history of Hartwick soccer as he is one of just 15 players in 52 years to score 30 or more goals in a career.

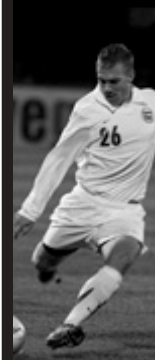
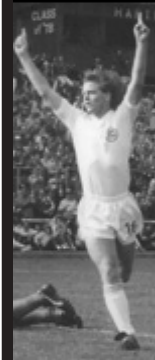
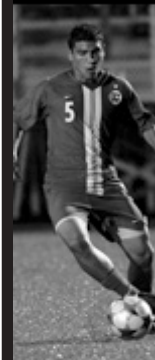

53 Years of Hartwick History

THE TRADITION

Hartwick College has fielded one of the nation's most successful college soccer programs over its 53 seasons of competition. The 'Wick began playing intercollegiate soccer in 1956, and posted its first winning record in 1958. Since then, Hartwick has recorded 43 winning seasons in the last 50 years.

The 'Wick won the NCAA Division I National Championship in 1977 and have been national contenders since the early 1960s. Hartwick has made 23 appearances in the NCAA Division I Playoffs, including 21 tournament berths in the past 38 seasons. Only six programs in the nation have accumulated more NCAA Tournament wins than Hartwick. The program qualified for 13 consecutive NCAA Tournaments between 1968 and 1980 and has reached the Final Four on seven occasions, including three times since 1980.

Hartwick claimed undefeated regular-season records in 1967, 1970, 1976, and 1977. Eight other regular seasons have ended with only one loss. Including postseason play, Hartwick has won 13 or more games 14 times, including a school-record 17 wins during the 1985 season.

THE PLAYERS

Since 1959, Hartwick has produced 26 All-Americans, with the most recent coming in 2004 as Edwin Ruiz was bestowed with the honor. Eleven of those players were multi-year All-Americans, and one, Alec Papadakis, was a three-time honoree in 1968, 1969, and 1970. The program also has produced two Hermann Trophy recipients, which is awarded to the top player in the NCAA Division I ranks. In 1976, former standout Glenn Myernick won the honor as he paced the then Warriors to a 16-1-1 overall mark and a spot in the national semifinals. The following year, Billy Gazonas was named the recipient after he led Hartwick to the national title with an undefeated 16-0-2 mark, including a 2-1 victory over San Francisco in the title game.



THE COACHES

Six men have held the title of head coach since the inaugural 1956 campaign. Each has left a winning record behind that has fueled the tradition of Hartwick soccer.

Hal Greig, who sadly passed away this past June, was Hartwick's first coach. He guided the team to a 7-2 victory over LeMoyne in the 'Wick's first soccer game. Hartwick's initial season ended with a 2-3 record, but Greig remained three more years, culminating his stay with



an 8-1 mark in 1959.

Greig also owns the distinction of coaching the first of Hartwick's 23 All-American players. Larry Serfis earned All-American honors following the 1959 campaign.

David Haase followed Greig as head coach. He led the 'Wick for seven seasons and produced a 55-15-3 record. Haase guided Hartwick to its first NCAA playoff berth in 1962 and led the team to the tournament again in 1964.

Two-time All-American Nick Papadakis was a star on those Hartwick teams. Papadakis is the College's all-time leading scorer. In 1963, Papadakis was joined by Tony Martelli and Walter Piepke on the national All-America team.

Haase left Hartwick to become the Director of Youth Development for the Atlanta Chiefs of the North American Soccer League.

The Hartwick success story continued with the hiring of Al Miller prior to the 1967 season. He won his first 11 games as head coach. The team eventually split a pair of Atlantic Coast Tournament games in the postseason.

During Miller's six-year stay, Hartwick qualified for postseason play every season and reached the NCAA Division I Final Four in 1970. His teams posted an impressive 7-3 mark in NCAA playoff contests.

Miller was hired as the first head coach of the NASL's Philadelphia Atoms in 1973. He directed the expansion franchise to the NASL Championship in his first season. Miller went on to serve as president of the Cleveland Crunch of the Major Indoor Soccer League.

Miller's successor was Timo Liekoski, an All-American player under



Miller and a 1971 graduate of Hartwick. Liekoski guided the 'Wick through three successful seasons. The team made three NCAA Tournament appearances and claimed third place in 1974. Following the 1975 campaign, Liekoski became Miller's assistant with the Dallas Tornado of the NASL.

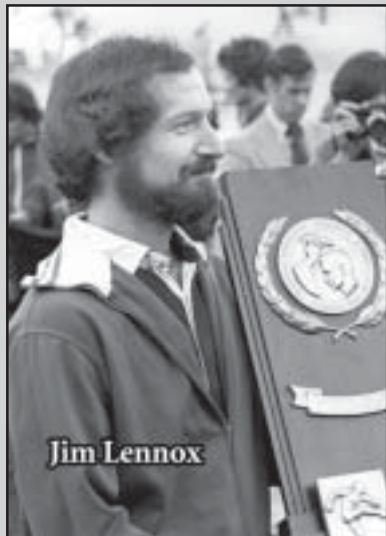
Liekoski eventually became one of the most successful coaches in the Major Indoor Soccer League. He led the Cleveland Force for six seasons and was the second coach in league history to win over 200 games. Liekoski also coached the Canton Invaders of the American Indoor Soccer Association, where he won two league championships.

Liekoski later served as an assistant coach on the 1994 U.S. World Cup team, head coach of the U.S. Under-23 team, and was the first head coach of the Columbus Crew of Major League Soccer. He is currently the Finland Youth National Team coach.

THE JIM LENNOX ERA

Liekoski's departure led to the arrival of Jim Lennox. In his 27 years as head coach from 1976-2002, Lennox enabled Hartwick to remain one of the top programs in collegiate soccer. His first team went 16-1-1 and finished third in the NCAA Tournament.

In 1977, the 'Wick again posted an undefeated regular season. In the NCAA playoffs, Hartwick defeated St. Francis, Cornell and Philadelphia Textile to reach the Final Four held at Berkeley, California.

In the semifinals against Brown, Hartwick fell behind 1-0 after four minutes of play but tied the game on a long shot by John Young just three minutes later. The 'Wick tallied three times in a 13-

minute span in the second half on the way to a 4-1 victory. All-American and Hermann Trophy winner Billy Gazonas scored the game-winner in the 55th minute.

The 1977 national championship game pitted Hartwick against two-time defending champion San Francisco. The match was scoreless until Hartwick's Art Napolitano headed in a free kick by Duncan MacDonald in the 48th minute.

Steve Long tallied on a breakaway in the 65th minute to give the 'Wick a 2-0 lead. San Francisco's only goal came with four minutes remaining. The Dons outshot the 'Wick 24-10, but Hartwick goalkeeper Aly Anderson made nine saves to preserve the win.

Upon their return to the Hartwick campus, the team was congratulated by an overflow crowd at the Binder Physical Education Center.

Hartwick has advanced to the national semifinals on seven occasions. In 1970 (St. Louis) and 1974 (Howard), the 'Wick fell to the eventual national champion. Five of the six semifinal losses were by one goal.

Hartwick reached the NCAA Tournament 13 times during the Lennox era, and he guided the program to the semifinal round of the playoffs five times. In addition to 1976 and 1977, Hartwick reached the Final Four in 1980, 1984, and 1985. During the 1984 and 1985 seasons, the 'Wick

was defeated by a single goal for a berth in the championship game.

In the Lennox era, Hartwick was 21-13 in NCAA playoff contests. Seven of the defeats were by one goal and only four losses came in the first round.

At the time of his retirement, Lennox was ranked ninth all-time among the winningest NCAA Division I coaches with 318 victories.

RETURN OF THE MAC

Former Hartwick All-American Ian McIntyre '96 replaced Lennox after the 2002 season. McIntyre, who became the program's 25th All-American in 1995, guided the 'Wick to a 15-2-1 record in his first season at the helm. His team followed that performance with a 13-3-3 record in 2004, and in 2005 Hartwick returned to the NCAA Tournament after posting a 13-6-1 record and winning the Atlantic Soccer Conference regular-season and tournament titles, defeating crosstown rival Oneonta State, 2-0, in the ASC Championship match. Hartwick

played Seton Hall in the first-round match-up and fell to the Pirates 2-1. McIntyre, in 10 seasons as a head coach, is now just three victories away from reaching the 100-win plateau (97-60-28).

MEMBERSHIP TO THE MID-AMERICAN CONFERENCE

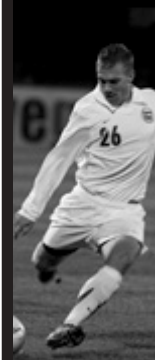
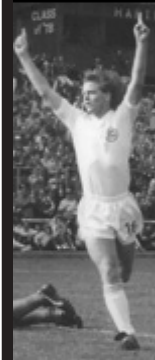
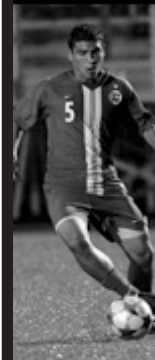
In 2006, Hartwick, which posted an 8-10-2 overall mark, competed in the Atlantic Soccer Conference for the last time. In May of 2007, the Hawks moved to the Mid-American Conference, where it immediately became eligible to compete for the league's automatic NCAA berth in 2007. Hartwick finished with the third seed in the tournament and defeated Western Michigan on penalty kicks to advance to the MAC semifinals, where it lost a last minute 1-0 decision to Buffalo. Last season, 'Wick advanced to the semifinals once again. This time, the Hawks played #4 Akron to a 1-1 draw in 110 minutes of action before falling in a shootout.

LOCATION

Hartwick's soccer team is a key feature of Hartwick College and the City of Oneonta.

The 'Wick has established a winning tradition and the team is the focus of local attention during the fall. Oneonta became known as "Soccertown, U.S.A." after a 1972 NCAA playoff match between Hartwick and Oneonta State was witnessed by more than 8,000 fans.

The National Soccer Hall of Fame is also located in Oneonta, largely spurred by the success of Hartwick soccer. James "Bernie" Ross, who captained Hartwick's inaugural men's soccer team in 1956, served as the first chairman of the board of the Hall of Fame, which was founded in 1982.

1977 National Champions

Hartwick claimed the 1977 NCAA Championship with a near perfect 16-0-2 record, defeating the University of San Francisco in the national championship game in Berkeley, California.

The Warriors were sparked by the outstanding play of freshman goalkeeper Aly Anderson

to the near post, where Art Napolitano headed it in.

"I just hit the ball on my follow through and then we cracked heads," Napolitano was quoted in the Oneonta *Daily Star*. "I didn't even see it go in the net."

Hartwick caught a break four minutes later when San Francisco's Tony Igwe's shot hit the far post with a shot from the right side that Anderson smothered on the rebound.

The Dons threatened to tie the game with a flurry of shots in the ensuing 15 minutes, but the Warriors were able to all but ice the game when Steve Long took a pass from Jeff Tipping and beat USF's Peter Artaunoff in a one-on-one situation to give the Warriors a 2-0 lead.

Hartwick lost its shutout bid in the 87th minute when the Dons finally capitalized, with Tony Gray heading home a corner kick from Igwe.

Anderson finished with nine saves as the Dons outshot the Warriors by a 24-10

margin. Hartwick's John Young was named the Final Four's Offensive Most Valuable Player after scoring a goal and adding an assist in the Warriors' 4-1 semifinal win over Brown. Tipping was named the tournament's Defensive MVP.

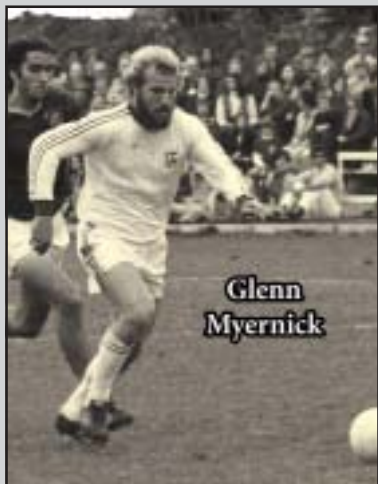

'Wick Hermann Trophy Winners



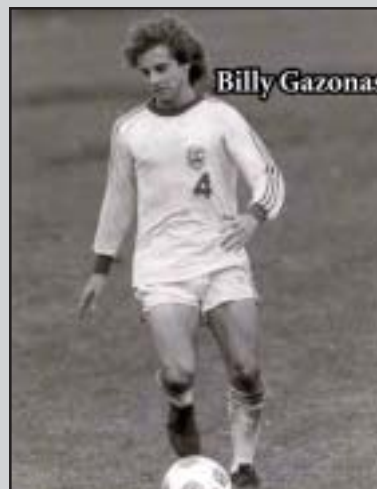

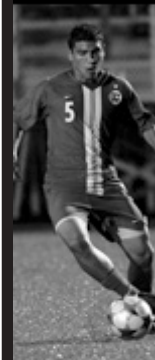
The Hermann Trophy is on display at the National Soccer Hall of Fame in Oneonta.

Myernick was team captain in 1976 and helped Hartwick reach the national semifinals with an undefeated record. Gazonas was the captain of Hartwick's NCAA championship team in 1977 that posted a 16-0-2 overall record. Both players were All-Americans for Hartwick and both have been enshrined into Hartwick's Athletic Hall of Fame.

Myernick (#2) and Gazonas (#4) are the only two Hartwick players to have their numbers retired.



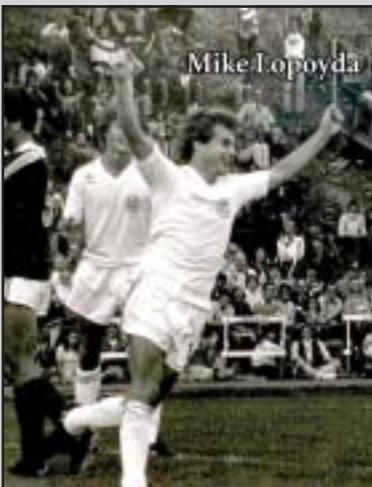

But along with the successes enjoyed on Elmore Field, our "extended soccer family" was also recognized for its many accomplishments in 2008-2009.

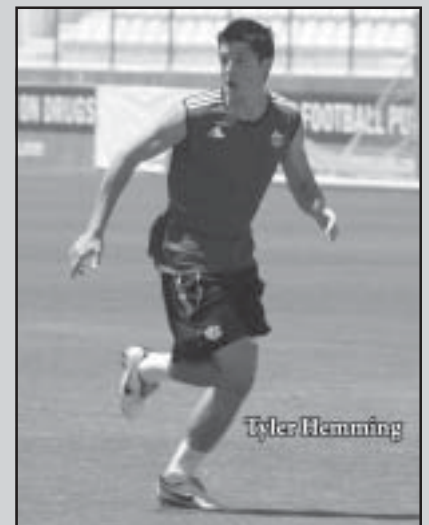

Mooch and the other honorees were honored at the NCAA College Cup at Pizza Hut Park in Frisco, TX.



Joe Gibson '09 was recognized for his academic excellence with the **'Wick Alumni Award** presented to the student athlete with the highest GPA after three semesters here at Hartwick College. Joe was also honored with the Frederick M. Binder Scholar Athlete Award presented by the Hartwick Athletic Department to a Senior Male Student-Athlete. The Hartwick Men's Soccer team was also recognized for success in the classroom as a NSCAA Academic Team Award Winner with an overall 3.3 team grade point average.

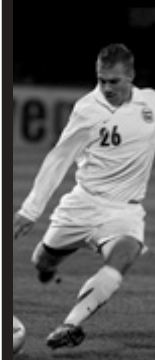
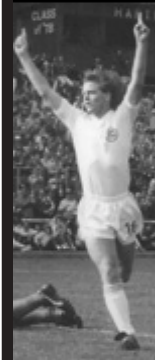
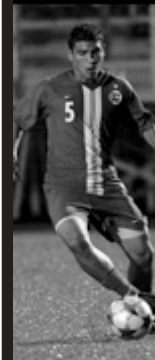
In June, legendary 'Wick soccer coach Hal Greig sadly passed away. Coach Greig was Hartwick's first head coach and patrolled the 'Wick sidelines from 1956 to 1959. He was an integral part of the creation and development of the Hartwick Soccer program and coached Hartwick's first All-American recipient, Larry Serfis.

Matt Lawrence '96 was inducted into the Hartwick College Hall of Fame as a member of the 2009 class. He was presented at the ceremony by his former coach, Jim Lennox. During a successful Hartwick career, Matt was a physically dominating midfield player who led his team to Final 8 and Final 16 appearances. Upon graduation from Hartwick, Matt immediately signed with Wycombe Wanderers in England and has enjoyed a professional soccer career that has stretched the last 14 years. He is still a key player on the Crystal Palace team that competes in the English Championship and he has worked with many great managers in the English game such as Kevin Keegan, Ray Wilkins, Dennis Wise, Mark McGhee, Peter Taylor, Laurie Sanchez and Neil Warnock. One highlight of Matt's illustrious professional career was captaining the Millwall Football Club team during the 2004 FA Cup Final. This prestigious Cup Final against Manchester United was played at the Millennium Stadium in front of a crowd of over 70,000.



Former 'Wick star Dominic Kinnear coached the Major League All-Star Team against Everton Football Club of the English Premier League. Kinnear has established himself as one of the premier coaches in MLS and is currently enjoying another tremendous season in 2009.

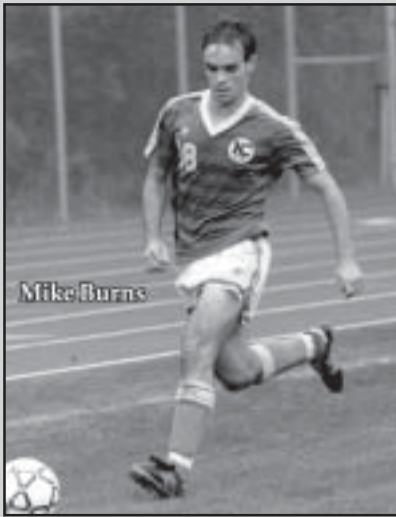
Soccer After Hartwick

Hartwick College has benefited from the efforts of many individuals who have been instrumental in the development of soccer in the United States. More than 40 former Hartwick players have entered professional soccer in the U.S. and overseas. Former coaches and players have joined national and professional teams as head coaches, assistant coaches, and front office staff members. Hartwick graduates have been hired as coaches at all levels of NCAA colleges.

NATIONAL TEAM AND PRO PLAYERS

Hartwick has had numerous former players who have been involved with the United States National Team program.

Mike Burns '92, the 1991 'Wick captain, was a member of the 1994 U.S. World Cup team and played in all three games for the U.S. in the 1998 World Cup. He earned a

total of 75 caps with the U.S. National Team from 1992-98.

Burns is an original member of Major League Soccer's New England Revolution. He retired from MLS after the 2002 season, and his seven-year career included stints with New England, San Jose, and Kansas City.

Matt Kmosko '95 made three appearances with the national team and started every match at the 1993 World University Games. He played in the MLS for Columbus, Miami, and Colorado.

Dominic Kinnear, who played at Hartwick during the 1985 season, saw action in 56 games with the U.S. national team. Kinnear left Hartwick for an 11-year professional career, including MLS stops in Colorado, San Jose, and Tampa Bay.

Other former Hartwick stars who have been selected to represent the United States include David D'Errico '74, Eddie Hawkins '84, Glenn Myernick '77, and Doug Wark '76. D'Errico earned 20 caps from 1974 to 1977, while Hawkins made his lone appearance against Ecuador in 1984. Myernick started four times for the U.S. Men's Olympic Team in qualifying for the

1976 Olympics, captained the U.S. Men's National Team in 1978 and retired from international play in 1979 with 10 appearances. Wark appeared in a match against Poland in 1975.

Hartwick graduates who are currently playing on the professional level include: Matt Lawrence '96 (Crystal Palace, English First Division), goalie Josh Wagenaar '07 (Falkirk FC, Scottish Premier League), Andrew Sambrook '01 (Gray's Athletic FC, English Second Division), George Neofotistos '95 (Levathiakos, Greek Third Division). Edwin Ruiz '04 was the first round pick of the MLS's Kansas City Wizards in 2005, the 11th player drafted over-

all, and Tyler Hemming '07 suited up with Toronto FC of the MLS after being a supplemental pick in the draft. He now starts for the USL's Charleston Battery.

PROFESSIONAL COACHES

Hartwick's soccer program has been led by outstanding head coaches and assistant coaches who have contributed to the growth of soccer beyond the collegiate level. Each man has made his own mark at the 'Wick as well as in the world of professional or international soccer.

David Haase, who coached the Hawks from 1960 until 1966, was the director of player development for the Atlanta Chiefs of the North American Soccer League.

Al Miller gained additional prestige as coach of the U.S. National Team. He also served as head coach of several teams in the NASL. As a general manager in the Major Soccer League (previously MISL), Miller helped the Cleveland Force gain success financially and on the field.

Miller helped start his own MSL team—the Cleveland Crunch. He is the former general manager of that club. Miller was inducted into the National Soccer Hall of Fame in 1995.

Timo Liekoski '71, who played for Miller, was an All-American defender at Hartwick. He later coached the Hawks from 1973 to 1975 and posted a 30-9-7 mark. His teams

made three straight NCAA Tournament appearances.

Liekoski was head coach of the United States Under-23 team as it prepared for the 1996 Olympic Games. He served as an

assistant coach for the United States National Team from June of 1991 until his appointment as the Under-23 coach on October 6, 1994. Liekoski was an assistant coach for the 1994 U.S. World Cup Team.

He later took a position as the first coach of the Columbus Crew of MLS. Liekoski is the current Finland Youth National Team coach. He has been a successful head coach in the NASL, MISL and NPSL.

Former 'Wick head coach Jim Lennox continued the great Hartwick tradition while becoming involved with soccer at the national level. He began working with the U.S. National "B" Team in 1989 and guided the U.S. efforts at the 1991 and '93 World University Games. Lennox coached more than 60 national team games.

Myernick was an assistant coach at Hartwick for six years, from 1986-91. Following his coaching career at his alma mater, he served an assistant coach for the U.S. National Team at the 2002 and 2006 World Cups. Myernick served as an assistant coach for the 1996 U.S. Olympic Team in Atlanta, where the team went 1-1-1 and just missed advancing to the second round.

Myernick also served as head coach of the United States Under-17 team and was an assistant coach for the the U.S. Under-20 team.

Myernick was the head coach of MLS's Colorado Rapids from 1997-2000, leading the Rapids to an appearance in MLS Cup '97 in his first season at the helm.

Myernick served as an assistant coach for the U.S. National Team prior to his

death in October, 2006.

Since ending his playing career, Kinnear has excelled in the coaching profession. Today, he is in his fourth season as head coach for the Houston Dynamo of the MSL. In 2006 and 2007, Kinnear piloted the Dynamo to the league title. He served three years as head coach for the San Jose Quake earning 2005 MLS Coach of the Year honors before the franchise moved to Houston. Entering 2009, he sported a 39-21-

32 career record with the club.

Other former players who have coached professionally include David D'Errico, Terry Fisher, Steve Jameson and Billy Gazonas. D'Errico was a player and later an assistant with the New York Arrows (MISL) and was the head coach of the Charlotte Gold of the United Soccer League. Fisher's coaching experience included stints as an assistant coach with the San Jose Earthquakes, Houston Hurricanes, and Calgary Boomers of the NASL and the Detroit Lightning of the MISL. Gazonas, after playing several seasons with the Kansas City Comets, became the assistant coach of the MSL team. Jameson played and coached for the Rochester Flash of the American Soccer League.

He also played professionally with the Sudbury Cyclones of the Canadian National Soccer League. Former Hartwick goalkeeper Mike Harrison worked with the Aston Villa Football Club in England.

SOCCER ADMINISTRATORS

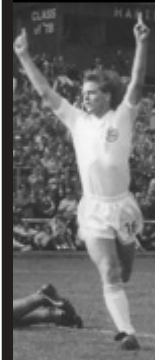
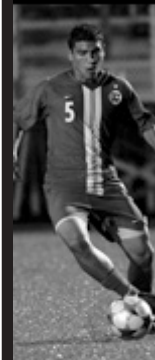
Francisco Marcos, a 1968 graduate, is one of the most influential soccer leaders in the U.S. He is the president and chief executive officer of the United Soccer Leagues (USL), a league he founded 17 years ago. Marcos also is the commissioner of the A-League, ranked the second division of soccer behind Major League Soccer.

Nick Romansky, a 1978 graduate, is an orthopedic surgeon and works with the U.S. National Team.

Jeff Tipping, also a 1978 graduate, has been serving as the Director of Coaching Development for the National Soccer Coaches Association of America since 2002. During his association with the NSCAA, he spent 13 years as an assistant director of coaching, before being elevated to director of coaching in 1996.

COLLEGE COACHES

Many Hartwick alumni are coaching at the collegiate level. The current list of men's head coaches includes: John Bluem '75 (Ohio State); Mark Mettrick '88 (Loyola University); Matt Kern '88 (Wofford); Carl Rees '89 (Fairfield); Bryan Scales '91 (UMass Lowell); and Dave Gregson '91 (Embry-Riddle). Geoff Bennett '95, an assistant coach at Hartwick in 2003, is the head coach of the women's team at Division I Colorado College, while Matt Verni '97 returned to Hartwick to take over the women's program in April 2007.



Oneonta Mayor's Cup



Hartwick won its 19th Mayor's Cup title in 2007 with shutout wins over James Madison (1-0) and Seton Hall (3-0).

One of the major sporting events each year in the City of Oneonta is the Mayor's Cup. Since 1976, Hartwick and Oneonta State had hosted two other NCAA Division I teams in college soccer's oldest regular-season tournament.

In 2006, Hartwick was the sole host for the men's tournament as Oneonta State realigned its men's soccer program and transitioned back to Division III status.

Last year, Hartwick went unbeaten (1-0-1) but it was Syracuse that brought home the trophy with shutout wins over UNC Wilmington (1-0) and Florida Gulf Coast (3-0). The Hawks, despite knocking on the

door throughout, were unable to get a goal in their opening match with FGCU. Two goals by JP Boyle and another by Sam Wright clinched a 3-1 win over UNC Wilmington.

In the 32nd edition in 2007, Hartwick blanked James Madison 1-0 as Chris Jackson converted a penalty kick in the first half. The Hawks polished off the tournament and regained the trophy with a convincing 3-0 victory over Seton Hall in lousy playing conditions on a soggy and drenched Elmore Field in a rematch of a first round matchup in the 2005 campaign. For the second-straight season, Chris Jackson was named the event's Offensive MVP, while Liam Parrington was

chosen as the Defensive MVP.

The 34th annual Mayor's Cup Soccer Tournament will be a classic format for the ninth straight year, with the pairings preset for all four matches.

Hartwick will be looking for its 20th Mayor's Cup title this season. 'Wick squares off with Bucknell at 7:30 p.m. on Friday, September 11 in a rematch of last season's 2-2 draw in Lewisburg, PA. The Hawks will then play Sunday afternoon at 2:30 p.m. against Loyola (MD). Syracuse, the fourth team in the tournament, will look to defend its crown.

Hartwick's Elmore Field



Elmore Field has been home to the men's soccer program since 1956. Including their 5-1-2 home record in 2008, the Hawks have a 266-75-27 record on their home turf. The postseason has been even better, with Hartwick winning 23 of 26 outings.

The field, constructed in 1949, was made possible by a gift from Earl Elmore, who owned feed mills in downtown Oneonta.

In 1987, Hartwick played its home games at Damaschke Field in Oneonta while Elmore was reconstructed, giving the field excellent drainage. The renovation created bleacher seating for up to 2,000 fans and increased Elmore's field size to 120' X 75', full regulation length and width.

Former Hartwick soccer player John Bronson '70 donated funds to put lights on Elmore in time for the 1998 season.

Fans traveling to Elmore in 2009 will notice some additional changes to the complex. During the 2007 campaign, a memorial in honor of the late and former Hartwick great Glenn "Mooch" Myernick '77 was added at the base of the complex. Signage boards, which surround the pitch, give Elmore a much different look as well. Hartwick will also be adding other fixtures to the complex in the coming years.

Mid-American Conference

Two years ago, Hartwick replaced former affiliate member IPFW, which moved into the Mid-Continent Conference. In 2008, Florida Atlantic was invited to join as an affiliate member. The full-fledged league members that sponsor men's soccer include Akron, Bowling Green, Buffalo, Northern Illinois, and Western Michigan.

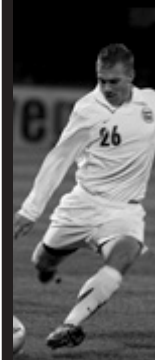
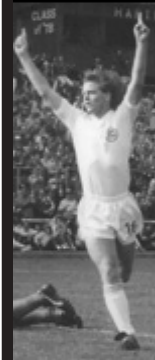
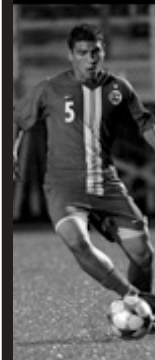
The Mid-American Conference added men's soccer to its resume in time for the 1993 campaign. In that year, Akron began its league dominance by capturing the league's regular-season title. The Zips have either outright won or shared the title 11 out of 16 years. The University of Kentucky, a former member, stands in second with four regular-season titles, while Bowling Green is third with three. Marshall, Miami of Ohio, and Northern Illinois each have one to their credit.

Despite playing the 1993 season, the conference didn't hold its first league tournament until the following year. In 1994, Miami captured its lone tournament title. Since then, Akron has

won six, while Bowling Green and Kentucky registered three league tournament titles. Western Michigan and Northern Illinois have the other two. Akron returns as the league regular-season and tournament champion. The Zips were ranked as high as #2 in the country last season and went through the MAC regular season with a perfect 6-0 mark.

In the conference semifinals, the Zips had to come from behind in the final 10 minutes against 'Wick to tie the score and force overtime before surviving in a shootout. In the title game against Northern Illinois, a 1-0 overtime win gave the Zips their 7th MAC crown and booked passage to the NCAAs.

The Zips have had past success in the NCAA Tournament. In 2003, 2005, and again in 2008, Akron advanced to the third round of the championship, which is the farthest a program in the league has gone. Akron was seeded 5th in the national tournament in '08 and defeated Ohio State 1-0 in overtime before falling to Northwestern 1-0 in the next phase.
