Symposium Description

Anthony Giddens stated that "The modes of life brought into being by modernity have swept us away from all traditional types of social order, in quite unprecedented fashion." The promise of the ascendancy of Western liberal democracy in the 21st century has gone largely unfulfilled. Instead, in the last decade, we have witnessed a rise in authoritarian politics, religious fundamentalism, and international conflicts that have been coupled with an increasing skepticism in scientific progress and independent journalism. We believe that 2025 represents a tipping point—a critical threshold in the struggle between democracy and authoritarianism, science and incognizance, and cooperation and discord. Our symposium offers an opportunity to reflect on how we got to this point and where we might go from here. Some major areas of focus include, but are certainly not limited to, the following:

- Threats to human rights in the 21st century How has late-stage capitalism altered the conventional relationships between people, places, work, and politics?
- The Russian invasion of Ukraine. Migration as experience in the context of Russian aggression against Ukraine.
- International, state, regional, and local aspects of (im)migration. Models, strategies, and actions for the integration of (im)migrants in contemporary states.
- The 2024 Elections. Democracy, authoritarianism, and the transformations of the radical and far right.

The symposium features scholarship from undergraduate students, graduate students, and faculty in the Upstate New York area. We are excited for attendees and participants to join us to discuss contemporary social issues, share ideas and opinions, and build a community of scholars.
